It has been the practice of the SJS BOM to give the Federated Council Representatives the authority to use their discretion when voting and to decide for whom the Section shall vote. There are eight (8) individuals on the ballot vying for five (5) seats; the Section has no nominees on the ballot. (Pages 1-2)

2. State CIF Budget for 2015-16

The proposed budget has salary schedule adjustments, which constitute salary increases for staff. This is largely due to the fact that the state's retirees' liability (unfunded liability) is fully funded. Both income and expenses are expected to slightly decrease (2%) primarily due to the loss of the state's presenting partner. All proposed budget adjustments are being made with no increased dues to member schools. (Page 3)

OLD BUSINESS (Voting Items)

Section

1. Election of Medium School Athletic Director Representative

The Section office announced at the January 21, 2015 Board of Managers meeting that with the retirement of Rick Francis, the Board needed to elect a new Medium Schools Athletic Director Representative to the Board for the 2015-16 and 2016-17 school years. The announcement was sent out to all Division III and IV school athletic directors requesting nominations to be sent by Monday, March 30, 2015. The Section office has received five (5) nominees. (Pages 4-8)

2. Proposed Budget (SJS) for 2015-16 - Emailed at a Later Date

The Section office will email a preliminary budget to the league commissioners and a finalized budget by April 24, 2015, after it has been approved by the Section Budget Committee.

3. Proposed Change to Season of Sport for Soccer

There has been continued discussion surrounding the topic of soccer (boys and girls) and its season of sport in the Sac-Joaquin Section. This has been discussed at the October 22, 2014 and January 21, 2015 Board of Managers meetings – all pros and cons have been discussed for remaining status quo as well as changing to the winter. The proposal before the board would change the season of sport for boys and girls soccer to the winter season, effective the 2016-17 school year. (Page 9)

4. Playoff Committee Recommendations

The playoff committee met on December 18, 2014 and January 16, 2015. Their hard work has resulted in multiple proposals for playoff changes effective 2015-16. Each proposal will be voted on separately.

A. Proposal – A league champion (outright, or is the No. 1 seed by criteria) must play at or above the level of its league competition in the following sports: football, girls volleyball, boys and girls basketball, boys and girls soccer, softball

This would require a team that wins a league championship (outright, or in the No. 1 seed by criteria), to play at or above the level of its league competition. For instance, if a school wins a championship in a D3 league but is D4 by enrollment, they would be required to play D3 in that year's playoffs. (Page 10)

B. Proposal – For cross country, change divisional alignments in Divisions I-IV This would change the divisional alignments from four equal divisions (Divisions I-IV) to set percentages. (Page 11)

C. Proposal – For football, add an additional qualifier from each of the seven leagues that have had the most playoff success over the past three years

This would grant an additional playoff spot to the seven leagues that have the most playoff success (playoff winning percentage) over the past three years bringing football in line with other enrollment based sports (girls volleyball, boys and girls soccer, and softball). (Page 12)

- D. Proposal For team tennis (boys/girls), add an additional qualifier for the SFL and Delta This will give each of these leagues a fourth qualifying spot in the team tennis playoffs. (Page 13)
- E. Proposal For water polo
 - 1) Add a third division.
 - 2) Allow three (3) teams from each league that have at least six (6) teams.
 - 3) Divide the qualifiers into three divisions based on enrollment and the usual success rules.
 - 4) Play the first two rounds at home sites.
 - 5) Play the semifinals and final at neutral sites. (Pages 14-15)

F. Proposal - Add north and south regional girls wrestling tournaments

This would create regional all-comers meets to qualify for the Section tournament, similar to what we do in boys wrestling. (Page 16)

Proposal Summary: The proposed budget recommends changes in income and expenses in several categories based upon past three years experiences, loss of marketing presenting partner. and reclassifying certain expenses based upon their natural category. All of these are accomplished with no increase in dues or legal assesment to schools. The budget indicates an end of the year surplus and the recommended changes are detailed in the "budget notes" that precede the itemized budget pages.

The are minor changes in the Championship Events category which include the addition of the badminton. The major change in the Marketing and Program budget is the loss of our presenting partner. Additionally with our retiree's liability fully funded, we will be pulling the premium dollars from that investment account instead of our day to day operating account. This change allows for the salary schedule adjustment without any impact to the burden for the organization.

Income Overview

Income is projected to slightly decrease (2%) based on the figures in the proposed budget, mainly due to the loss of our presenting partner. Consistent with past practice, the projected figures are based upon a conservative income model. \$5.39 million to \$5.24 million

Expenses Overview

Expenses are projected to decrease as well (2%) based on the figures in the proposed budget, again largely due to the loss our presenting partner. \$5.34 million to \$5.18 million

If the SJS keeps boys soccer in the fall and girls soccer in the spring:

- 1-Neither sport is in the state season of sport of winter, and Rule 600 is not in effect.
- 2-If a state or regional playoff is created, the SJS would not be allowed to participate.
- 3-A common complaint is that girls have to choose between softball and soccer in the spring.
- 4-Soccer is currently played in the two busiest sport seasons.

If the SJS moves both boys and girls soccer to the winter:

- 1-Rule 600 would be in effect. (outside competition would not be allowed)
- 2-Some of our schools will experience weather (snow) issues.
- 3-More officials will be needed each week.
- 4-When one gender is playing a game at home, the other gender may struggle to find a place to practice.
- 5-Daylight is limited in the winter season. Those without access to lights will have to start earlier or not play lower level.
- 6-A move to winter will open up more winter opportunities for both boys and girls.
- 7-A move to winter would allow the SJS to participate in regional competition, if it occurred.
- 8 If a school has the same coach for both boys and girls, that would be a conflict.

If the SJS creates split seasons (fall-spring and winter-winter)

- 1 Rule 600 would be in effect for some schools and not others.
- 2 If regional competition is created, only the winter-winter schools would be allowed to participate.
- 3 Instead of 7 divisions per gender, there would be 3 or 4 per season. Therefore, the divisional splits would be more spaced out.

Fiscal Impact: None

Rationale: Schools currently are allowed to play at their enrollment level in playoffs, except in cases of continued success rules or they must play no more than one level below their league placement. In this case, a school that is successful (league champion) in a league would have to play at that level in playoffs.

Other Considerations:

- 1 -- If implemented, all seven Division I league champions would have to play in D1.
- 2 -- In this scenario for football, six league champions this year would have had to play one division higher than they actually did play. Of note, Grant, St. Mary's, Capital Christian and Modesto Christian would have been affected.
- 3 -- Each league would have to break all first-place ties.

Proposal Summary: Change the divisional alignments from four equal divisions (Divisions I-IV) to set percentages.

Division I -- 20 % (approximately 26 schools)

Division II -- 25 % (approximately 33 schools)

Division III -- 25 % (approximately 33 schools)

Division IV -- 30 % (approximately 39 schools)

NOTE: Division V is currently limited to schools with enrollment at or below 600. This is the state limit for that division. We do not propose any change for Division V.

Fiscal Impact: None

Rationale: Unlike most sports, dividing all schools equally into four divisions does not give you an equal number of competitors/teams per division.

This year, on the boys side, this is the number of teams competing by division: D1-30; D2-22; D3-24; D4-21. On the girls side, D1-27; D2-20; D3-15; D4-16.

As you can see, by far Division I has the most teams competing even though the number of eligibile. teams per division is equal.

Other Considerations:

The cross country coaches have argued that Division I should have less schools for a different reason -- competitiveness at the state level, where the Southern Section has many very large high schools.

Proposal Summary: Currently, in most of the playoff sports that are based on enrollment (girls volleyball. boys and girls soccer and softball), leagues that have had the most playoff success in the past three years are granted an additional playoff spot for the succeeding year. This proposal grants an additional playoff spot to the seven leagues that have had the most playoff success (playoff winning percentage) over the past three years.

Fiscal Impact: None

Rationale: This is similar to what we already do in girls volleyball, boys and girls soccer, baseball and softball. For these sports, we give an additional playoff spot to the top 9 leagues (26 total leagues) based on winning percentage in the playoffs over the previous three years. However, with less leagues in football (21), we are proposing the top 7 leagues. The top 7 leagues represent one-third of the leagues, which is approximately the same percentage for the top 9 leagues among 26.

Other Considerations:

- 1 -- The SFL and Delta are extremely strong leagues that currently already get a third automatic qualifier that was agreed to during the realignment process. There are those that think they deserve a fourth qualifier guaranteed (The SFL did qualify four teams this year and the Delta qualified five). This would accomplish that goal as long as they continue to do well in playoffs.
- 2 -- Most, if not all, of the third place teams among the seven "best" leagues would qualify anyway under the current system. This simply guarantees it. Only three leagues (CAL, SJAA and SVC) did not qualify their third-place teams this year.
- 3 -- This means that instead of 28 at-large qualifiers, there will be only 21 at-large qualifiers.

Proposal Summary: Revamp water polo playoffs by adding a third division, allowing maximum qualifiers as in other sports, basing divisions on enrollment and success rules, playing matches prior to the semifinals at home sites and holding the semifinals and finals at neutral sites.

Fiscal Impact: Unknown. Moving away from neutral sites in the early rounds could have a negative impact on revenues, but it is truly not known.

Rationale: With 13 leagues and 74 schools participating, we are at the maximum for two divisions of competition. We currently have to limit how many leagues can qualify three teams in Division I. This would allow for three tournaments with between 8 and 12 teams each and room to grow to 16 before adding a fourth division. With more divisions, more teams would be able to win, or at least vie for, Section titles. Jesuit, St. Francis and Davis Sr. have dominated the Division I boys and girls divisions, while Rio Americano has won 12 of the last 20 titles in Division II boys and girls. Moving away from neutral sites in early rounds allows for games to be played in the afternoon and that would lessen the burden on missed class time.

Other Considerations:

- 1-Some pools do not meet the minimum size and depth requirements by NFHS. We will have to work with schools on this matter.
- 2-Coaches will not be happy that they will not be able to go to a neutral site and watch all day in order to select All-Section players (this is not a function of the SJS, but we have supported this endeavor).

- 3-Eliminating the first-round neutral site, we alleviate a large concern of schools having to travel long distances and play at 8:00 a.m.
- 4-Schools will be asked to charge admission at the home sites. They should be able to charge, since pools are usually surrounded by a fence. If they cannot charge, they will be assessed the \$225 non-charge fee we implemented this year.
- 5-It will be our intent to seed the tournaments by number, as we do in the other enrollment-based sports.
- 6-The last contest date will have to be moved up from Saturday, October 31 to Thursday, October 29 to accommodate seeding the tournament on Friday, October 30. It is our intent to allow teams to play non-league matches through Saturday, October 31 as we do now. It appears that most of the leagues can accommodate this change.
- 7-No more than 12 home-site matches per day in the early rounds will be played. Thus, we will need at least 24 officials available for those days.

Proposal Summary: Add north and south qualifying tournaments as regional all-comers events that lead to the Section tournament in girls wrestling.

Fiscal Impact: This will probably generate a small increase in profits for girls wrestling. The current regional tournament operates at a profit.

Rationale: The current all-comers Section/Regional tournament is on the verge of outgrowing McNair High School (and any other high school site, for that matter).

Last year (2013-14 school year), there were 307 wrestlers that competed at the regional event. That's an average of 22 wrestlers per weight class with the lower weight classes with larger numbers.

This year (2014-15), 617 girls have been assessed in the Sac-Joaquin Section and are eligible to compete. Also, the current regional includes girls from the Northern Section, which has about 50 wrestlers.

Two regional all-comers would be manageable, and we would be able to then limit the number of qualifiers to the Section meet.

Other Considerations:

- 1-This would be another step toward advancing the sport for girls wrestling.
- 2-Dates and locations for the regionals will have to be worked out.

Seeding Procedures

The volleyball handbook could be amended with the following changes:

The CIF State Volleyball Championships will be conducted using one eight-team Open Division bracket in both the north and south. Divisions I-V will use sixteen-team brackets in both the north and south. Division VI in the north will remain an 8-team bracket.

Girls Volleyball Open Division

- 1) There will be two regional Open Division brackets (one in the north and one in the south).
- 2) Each regional Open Division bracket will have a maximum of eight (8) teams.
- 3) No more than 50% of the bracket (4 teams) will be from the same section.
- 4) Teams must compete, and qualify through, their respective CIF Section Championships to participate in CIF Open Division Championships.
- 5) The tournament committee will select the teams for the Open Division before they seed the 5 divisions in the south and 6 divisions in the north.
- 6) Teams selected for the Open Division will compete in the Open Division ONLY and cannot opt out.
- 7) Teams that participate in a Section Open Division will revert to the division the team would have participated in had they not been selected for the Section Open. For example: A team is listed as Section DII, they are selected and participate in the Section Open Championship. The team is put forward by the section but IS NOT selected for the State Open Division. The team can only compete in the State DII bracket.
- 8) If a section has a team selected for the Open Division, the section may elect to replace that team, from their designated division, with another team from the section. The section must have a policy in place which outlines the process the section will use to fill spots vacated by teams selected for the State Open Division.

Open Division Criteria: The following criteria will be utilized to select the teams for the Open Division for the CIF State Volleyball Tournament. A school needs to only satisfy one of the criteria below to be considered:

- a. A school has competed in their Section Semi-Finals 2 out of the last 3 years.
- b. A school qualified and participated in the CIF Regional Championships 2 out of last 4 years.
- c. A school qualifying for their regional playoffs may request to be placed in the open division.





In its inaugural season, during the 2012-13 school year, ABLE fielded a boys basketball team and competed in eight regular season games. This school year we added co-ed cross-country as well as three new spring sports in boys baseball, girls soccer and co-ed track.
