Proposal Summary:

This proposal places into our bylaws the requirement of using specified balls ("Official Balls"), for postseason play, in those sports in which the Section has executed contracts. Additionally, it outlines sanctions for the violation of not using the appropriate game ball(s) for postseason play.

Fiscal Impact:

None

Rationale:

The Section signs contracts with ball manufacturers in which the Section receives a financial contribution for the specific ball manufacturer to serve as the "official Ball" of that sport. This has been the long-standing practice of the Sac-Joaquin Section and currently is only outlined in our formats. There are times when our schools do not use the required ("Official Ball") and because the requirement is only in our formats, we do not have the backing within our bylaws. This proposal would argument our playoff formats and provides a clear penalty for schools that violate the terms of our agreements with our ball manufacturers.

Bylaw 503.8 Use of "Official" Balls for Sac-Joaquin Section Playoffs

- a. Each school shall provide the "official" ball for all Sac-Joaquin Section playoff contests. NOTE: These are the official balls for the 2020-2021 school year:

 - Football Wilson GST1003, F1001 or F1005
 - Soccer Wilson Forte
 - Softball Wilson A9011-SST Optic Yellow

 - Volleyball Molten Super Touch or Pro Touch
 - Water Polo KAP 105 (Boys), KAP 104 (Girls)
- b. If a school does not provide the official ball for a Sac-Joaquin Section playoff contest the following sanctions will be imposed:
 - i. 1st Infraction: Warning
 - ii. 2nd Infraction: Loss of home site playoffs privileges (school will not be able to host playoff contests and will forfeit any travel reimbursement funds for remainder of the school year. Penalty does carry over to next season, if applicable).

Proposal Summary:

The Executive Committee is recommending a revision to the collections procedure under Accounts Receivable of the Sac-Joaquin Section Policy and Procedures Manual.

Fiscal Impact:

Could generate additional revenue

Rationale:

The Section continues to experience at the close of the books each year, schoosl who have outstanding debt to the Section in the form of unpaid invoices; this makes closing books for the fiscal year very difficult and causes additional unnecessary work on staff's part. The implementation of a late fee is appropriate and would hopefully serve as a deterrent to not processing invoices in a timely manner.

PAYMENT AND COLLECTIONS

Receipt of payment must be secured through the use of a cash register, locked drop box, or locked cash bag. Revenues thus collected must be deposited to the Section within one business day. Payments on invoices must be mailed directly to the Section. Additionally, customers may pay invoices in person during business office hours.

The Finance/HR Manager shall carry out collection procedures according to the following schedule:

✓ 10 days past due
 ✓ 30 days past due
 Reminder Letter/Second Notice
 Final Notice pending \$25 late fee

✓ 45 days past due \$50 late fee

Accounts paid with checks that are later returned for insufficient funds shall be considered unpaid and shall be subject to collection procedures. In addition, the offending customer shall be assessed a fee to offset bank charges. Customers with more than one returned check in a fiscal year shall lose their check writing privileges.  - i. All leagues qualify four wrestlers to the divisional tournament.
 - ii. Division IV will qualify four wrestlers to the Masters tournament. No alternates.
 - 5. Division V -- MLL, PVL, SAL, SDL, SVC and TVL.
 - i. The MLL, PVL, SVC and TVL will qualify four wrestlers to the divisional tournament; The SAL will qualify three; and SDL will qualify two wrestlers.

Proposal Summary:

This <u>one-year-only</u> waiver would change the SJS football postseason format from seven divisions (with the majority of 12-team brackets) to nine divisions of eight-team brackets. Additionally, there is added language (note and item iv) in case the season is reduced, and further adjustments need to be made.

Fiscal Impact:

We are unsure at this point; with fewer games (79 to 71) there is the potential of revenue loss

Rationale:

When the new CIF sport calendar was announced, the overall football season was reduced by one week. SJS staff chose to subtract one week from the postseason instead of the regular season, so we needed to alter the postseason. We had to alter the division designations (I-A, I-AA, etc.) to continue to follow our "league champion" and "league division" rules. If a team is forced to compete at the Division I level, due to the continued success rule, they can compete at the I-A or I-AA level.

Playoffs

- a. Sac-Joaquin Section competition will consist of seven nine divisions in football: Divisions I-A, I-AA, II-AA, III, IV, V, VI and VII.
- b. Playoff formats will be published for the football playoffs for each division. See Calendar of Events for tentative dates.
- c. Tie-breaker system will be the one outlined in Bylaw 2006.1 above.
- d. Qualifying -- Divisions I-VII
 - 1. Each league will qualify one team for the playoffs. If a league has multiple league champions, they will all qualify for the playoffs.
 - 2. At-Large Qualifiers

For the purposes of at-large qualifying, all schools will be divided equally into seven nine divisions. If there is an odd number of teams, the first additional school will fill in at Division I-A, then Division I-AA and so on.

- i. In each divisional group, eight schools will be selected for playoff competition.
 - a. All automatic qualifiers will be selected first.
 - b. The remaining qualifiers will be selected based on their calpreps.com ranking.

(Each division may vary - for example Division III may have 10 automatic qualifiers and 2 at-large qualifiers while Division V may have 6 automatic qualifiers and 6 at-large qualifiers.)

- ii. If necessary, the school(s) that are not league champions and have the Calpreps ranking in any column may be moved down to a lower division to have an even number of teams in each division.
- iii. At-large selections must win a minimum of four games during the regular season.
 NOTE: The Section office will make adjustments for teams unable to play a full season due to COVID-19 limitations.
- iv. If the entire football season is reduced/unable to begin on January 8 due to COVID-19 restrictions, Section staff (in conjunction with the Executive Committee) will announce adjustments for the entire season.

Proposal Summary: The CIF San Diego Section is proposing the addition of Girls Beach Volleyball as a CIF sanctioned spring sport to begin in 2021-2022 school year. Beach volleyball is currently sanctioned by the NCAA as a scholarship sport for women and is also sanctioned by USA Volleyball, the US Olympic and Paralympic Committee and the International Olympic Committee. The addition of Girls Beach Volleyball would allow for increased participation opportunities for high school girls.

The proposal would add Beach Volleyball to the list of approved sports in CIF Bylaw 1200, revise Article 170 and Bylaw 1700 and would renumber the remaining Articles related to CIF approved sports (see proposal).

The proposal also includes a revision to Bylaw 600.

Fiscal Impact: There is no fiscal impact to the CIF at this time as it is not being proposed as a championship event. There, of course, would be costs involved for CIF member schools choosing to offer this as a sport.

Background: Currently there are club beach volleyball programs at over 100 CIF member schools with over 1,300 girls participating in those programs.

Talking Points: Additional opportunity for girls to participate in education-based athletics; fairly inexpensive sport with respect to equipment and uniforms; can be expensive to build an oncampus facility but there are an increasing number of facilities that offer courts for rent; student-

athletes would be eligible to participate in pairs tournaments in outside events during the high school season of sport (unattached to a club team)

ARTICLE 60 OUTSIDE COMPETITION

600.G. Unattached Competition in Individual Sports (see also Bylaw 215)

- (1) An unattached athlete shall not represent any team. Points won by the athlete shall not be credited to any team. An unattached athlete shall not use a uniform which identifies a school or "outside" team. Any violation shall be considered an infraction of Bylaw 600.
- Unattached competition is permissible for a student in other than school contests during the season of sport provided the student enters in the individual sports of badminton (singles and doubles), beach volleyball (pairs), cross country, golf, gymnastics, skiing, swimming and diving (including unattached entry on relays), tennis (singles and doubles), track and field (including unattached entry on relays) and wrestling.
- (3) Certification of Unattached Athletes

No official recognition or certification on the part of the CIF member school or personnel of the CIF member school may be given in order that unattached athletes may participate in contests.

(4) Representation in CIF Competition

Unattached competition is not permitted in any CIF competition (See Bylaw 503.D.). Individuals or teams entered in CIF competition must represent a CIF member school. No other form of representation shall be permitted in CIF competition.

NOTE: Alpine, Nordic Skiing and Snowboarding are exempt for this Bylaw as the season of sport is not defined and listed under Bylaws 503.D. and 504.H.and that all competitions are done in conjunction with the Nevada Interscholastic Activities Association.

C. Competition Cheer (see A. and B. above) shall not be counted towards a school Title IX compliance unless the U.S. Department of Education Office for Civil Rights deems Competition Cheer compliant with its definition of a sport.

As per Bylaw 1201 A., the National Federation of High Schools (NFHS) Spirit Rules Book shall be the official rule book.

1702 1802. SAFETY CERTIFICATION OF COACHES

Schools must ensure that all TCC and CSC coaches, paid and unpaid, will have completed a safety education program that emphasizes the following components:

- A. A philosophy of safety awareness,

Full contact practice is defined by state statute as a practice where drills or live action is conducted that involves collisions at game speed where players execute tackles and other activity that is typical of an actual tackle football game. 2003 2103. PHYSICAL CONDITIONING PRACTICE

A high school shall not conduct a physical conditioning practice session during the summer prior to the opening date of authorized football practice, unless so authorized by the appropriate Section.

For safety reasons, the landing sector for both the discus and shot put will be changed to 34.92 degrees and, furthermore, a clearly marked safety area will be maintained at 60 degrees in order to increase safety for participants, officials and spectators. 3201 3301. 40-MATCH RULE

A wrestler will be allowed a maximum of 40 matches during the wrestling season prior to the first qualifying tournament for the CIF State Wrestling Championships (in most situations this would be the league wrestling tournament). Forfeits do not count towards the 40-match maximum. Matches wrestled in any tournaments or competitions held prior to the first qualifying tournament will count towards the 40-match maximum.

PENALTY: Violation of Article 3201 3301 will result in the following sanctions:

- A. If an athlete goes over the prescribed 40 match limit, the athlete shall be ineligible for any further competition for the season. In addition, the Section may impose the following additional sanctions:
 - (1) The final season record will be reduced by at least one (1) win at the conclusion of the season;
 - (2) The school will be placed on probation;
 - (3) The team/individual will be ineligible to advance to or in Section, Regional or State Championships;
 - (4) Reduction of maximum number of matches allowed for the following year in that sport;
 - (5) Repeated violation may result in suspension of membership in the CIF.

3202 3302. WEIGH-INS

- A. All CIF member schools must follow all National Federation Rules and procedures concerning weigh-ins.
 - (1) Violation of NFHS Rule 4-5-5 will result in the following sanction: the host school will not be allowed to host any tournament or the following year and cannot financially benefit from any other tournament for that year. In addition, the Section may impose the following additional sanctions:
 - a. The hosting school is placed on probation.
 - b. Reduction of maximum number of matches.
- B. California provides 14 weight classes per NFHS Rules and the two (2) pound growth allowance to each weight class on January 1.
- C. Each coach is required to bring his/her team's Pre-Match Weigh-In Form to all competitions including the CIF State Wrestling Championships.
 PENALTY: Failure to comply will result in the entire team being ineligible to compete and charged with forfeiture.
- D. Each wrestler is required to weigh in with his/her Pre-Match Weigh-In Form at all competitions up to and including the competition that begins the CIF State Championship qualifying series.
 - **PENALTY**: Failure to comply will result in the wrestler being ineligible for that competition.
- E. The use of laxatives, emetics, excessive food and liquid restriction, self-induced vomiting, hot rooms, hot boxes, saunas and steam rooms is prohibited for any purpose. The use of diuretics at any time is prohibited. Regardless of the purpose, the use of vapor-impermeable suits (e.g. rubber or rubberized nylon) or any similar devices used solely for dehydration is prohibited. Artificial means of rehydration (i.e. intravenous hydration) are also prohibited. Violators of these rules shall be suspended for the competition(s) for which the weigh-in is intended. A second violation would result in suspension for the remainder of the season.

San Diego High School Beach League

2013 - present

OVERVIEW

The Sand Volleyball Association (aka. San Diego HS Beach League) was formed in 2013 in an effort to bring the sport of girls' beach volleyball to the high school level. In its first year, 8 schools participated. In 2020, over 40 San Diego schools will participate with representation from every major conference in the county.

GOALS

To legitimize the sport of Girl's High School Beach Volleyball by recognizing it as a CIF sanctioned sport at the city, regional, and state levels.

INFORMATION

- In 2019, more than 400 female athletes participated in high school beach volleyball from San Diego schools. Across the state, more than 1000 girls participated in various high school club leagues.
- Arizona and Fiorida currently have high school beach volleyball approved as a State Championship sport. Washington is in the process as well.
- Collegiate beach volleyball is the fastest growing sport in the nation. Currently 83
 colleges offer beach programs at the Division i, ii, and iii levels. 16 NAIA colleges and 38
 junior colleges nation-wide have programs as well, with more being added each year.
- High school athletes now have the opportunity to earn a college scholarship for beach volleyball
- In addition to the high school league, there are year round tournaments across the nation
 that cater to high school athletes and culminate in national championships in July. Over
 5,000 girls participate in these events each year.
- The demand for the legitimacy of our sport increases each year as the sport continues to gain popularity at all levels.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION TO CONSIDER

- in San Diego, 7 schools currently have sand courts on campus, and 5 more are in the process of building courts.
- The cost to build 2- 5 courts ranges from \$15,000 \$150,000 depending on
 the size of the facility and the type of sand used:
- Most schools currently practice at local beaches and the cost to run their programs is roughly \$3000 - \$4500 for the season. This covers the league fee, insurance, uniforms, equipment, and coaches' stipends.
- The league is run under CIF guidelines, so the transition from a club sport to a sanctioned sport would be seamless.
- Teams from San Diego, Los Angeles, Central California, and Northern California have competed annually in a State Championship match since 2015.

GOAL

Our goal is to legitimize the sport of beach volleyball at the high school level and allow more girls the opportunity to compete for their high schools in a sanctioned sport across the State of California.

Proposal Summary: In January 2020, the Federated Council approved regional championships for the sports of softball and baseball. This proposal sets the allowable number of contacts for these two sports at 28 and also states that tournaments will be counted as one (1) contact for each game. Implementation would be for the 2021-2022 school year.

Fiscal Impact: None

Background: In January 2018, the Federated Council approved the allowable number of contacts for all sports culminating in a regional and/or state championship. Given that the Federated Council, in January 2020, approved softball and baseball as regional championship events, this proposal to add the allowable number of contacts for these two sports is being forwarded to the Federated Council.

Talking Points: Number of contacts equitable to that of basketball, soccer, volleyball and water polo; tournament contacts same as basketball, soccer and water polo

1206. MAXIMUM CONTACTS

A. Starting Dates for Practice

Sections shall determine the first day of practice in all sports.

B. Scrimmages

A scrimmage is defined as:

- An activity involving teams or individual student-athletes from two or more different schools in a CIF approved sport; AND
- (2) Where no official score is kept; AND
- (3) Where regulation time is not kept; AND
- (4) Where substitute rules are set aside; AND
- (5) Where coaches may stop play for instructional purposes: AND
- (6) Where no score / results are released to the media.

C. Number of Scrimmages

A maximum of two (2) scrimmages per sport are permissible prior to the first interscholastic contest (league or non-league) of the season, except in Football which is limited to one (1) scrimmage. Scrimmages shall not count in the team or individual maximum number of contacts, unless it is held after the team's first interscholastic contest.

D. Allowable Number of Contacts

Sections shall determine the maximum number of allowable contacts. Sections, however, for sports culminating in a Regional or State Championship may not set a limit higher than:

The maximum number of allowable contacts is in effect for teams during the regular season. The maximum number of allowable contacts does not include Section Foundation or Scholarship Games, League culminating tournament, Section, Regional or State Championships.

Basketball One (1) contact for each game.

Golf Tournaments count as one (1) contact per day.

Soccer One (1) contact for each match.

Softball One (1) contact for each game.

Tennis One (1) contact for each match.

Volleyball One (1) Day Tournament counts as two (2) contacts.

Two (2) Day Tournament counts as three (3) contacts.

Water Polo One (1) contact for each game.

Proposal Summary:

The SJS Executive Committee and staff are recommending that each league shall determine its seasons of sport for each of its sports, within the parameters established by the Section's start and end dates - February 1, 2021 to June 12, 2021.

Fiscal Impact:

Lack of playoff income.

Rationale:

The CIF Sac-Joaquin Section has a membership of 189-member high schools. Those 189 schools are scattered throughout 16 counties, which are represented within three (3) of the state of California's recently developed five (5) regions (Greater Sacramento, San Joaquin Valley, Bay Area), in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The current SJS Season of Sport calendar (season #1 & season #2), developed in July 2020, as a result of what we knew at the time related to the COVID-19 pandemic, is not an effective model for the membership. This is due to the restrictions placed on regions & counties, and the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) "Outdoor and Indoor Youth and Recreational Adult Sports" guidelines.


Because there is no timeline as to when a region will be released from the "stay-at-home" order or when a county color will allow participation in a particular sport, a one-size fits all calendar no longer works. Additionally, the 189 members are contained within 26 leagues, only 14 of the 26 leagues can fulfill obligations of a league schedule. The remaining 12 of the 26 leagues cannot, as the counties in which those schools are located do not meet current travel restrictions (can only participate against schools in an adjacent county as long as they are in the same appropriate colored tier) set forth by CDPH. Each league should have the freedom to do what works best for it.

Because of these reasons, it is the recommendation of the Sac-Joaquin Section Executive Committee and staff that the Sac-Joaquin Section establish the following as our season of sport for the remainder of the 2020-21 school year:

2020-21 SJS IMPORTANT NOTICES

FOOTBALL

Due to safety protocols set by the CIF Sports Medicine Advisory Committee (SMAC), football play must conclude no later than April 17, 2021.

INTER-TEAM COMPETITIONS

As a reminder, CDPH has authority over when inter-team competitions (i.e., two teams) may take place. Current guidance has a date of January 25, 2021. No athletic competitions can begin until the "Stay at Home" order has been lifted for the region.

EQUITY

As per CIF Bylaws:

- 504.D: Sections and/or leagues shall set seasons of sport so that they provide equal opportunity for all students to participate, including intersectional competition and State championships in like sports, and softball and baseball.
- 505.C: Each section and/or league that establishes a maximum and/or minimum number of allowable contests for member schools shall establish the same number of allowable contests for teams in identical sports, and in baseball and softball.

LEAGUE SCHEDULES

Leagues must provide to the SJS office their seasons of sport calendar as soon as it has been approved by its league. The Section will be charting all league sport calendars on the section website.

Non-league affiliates (associate members) must also provide the SJS office their seasons of sport calendar as soon as the school principal has approved it.

Under the current conditions (ending June 12, 2021) schools, with the approval of all leagues involved, can change leagues. Any changes to league alignments must be submitted to the Section office. The Section office will monitor, and post said changes.

CONDITIONING OR CDPH GUIDANCE

During the school year and outside of the season of sport, SJS schools will adhere to CDPH and county health guidance.

All sports not within the league-mandated season of sport dates will fall under the limited/out-of-season period (Bylaw 504.7 and 504.9)

REGRESSING COLOR TIERS

The Executive Committee understands and expects that counties will fluctuate between color tiers, at times moving backwards. When the league's season of sport has officially started and a County regresses to a more restrictive tier, the school shall adhere to CDPH and county health guidance.

CIF REGIONAL/STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

If the CIF is able to conduct regional or state championships, SJS schools will not be eligible to participate as no qualifier (SJS Section Championship) is being conducted.

COHORT

Current CDPH guideline state: "Athletes and Coaches should cohort by team, and refrain from participating with more than one team over the same season or time period". CIF interpretation is students and coaches WILL/SHALL participate in only one cohort at any time.

Proposal Summary: The Southern Section is proposing an exception to CIF Bylaw 504.M. to allow Traditional Competitive Cheer teams to compete on Sunday at the NHSCC event. This exception may be used one-time per school year for the above event only.

Fiscal Impact: There is no fiscal impact to the CIF at this time as the proposal does not impact a championship event. There, of course, would be costs involved for CIF member schools choosing to attend this event.

Background: In TCC, the season of sport is much longer than that of any other sport. Cheerleaders also do not participate in traditional head-to-head competition in their leagues like other sports do. National-level competitions have provided opportunities for high school athletes to compete and be seen by college recruiters. These athletes will miss the important opportunities that they have had prior to CIF inclusion. Asking these competitions to move away from their Sunday spot is difficult as they require large venues.

This proposal is being brought back as a continued first reading from the October Federated Council meeting due to the following new information. It has come to our attention that the sport of skiing/snowboarding has been allowed to practice and compete on Sundays given the unique nature of the sport and the fact that there is competition with Nevada schools which allow for Sunday competition in that sport. This provides some context to the concern that we would be allowing an exception for cheer that has not been allowed for any other sport.

Talking Points: TCC does not currently have a season of sport; This exemption would enable school teams to compete at the national level event; Can only be used at the NHSCC and no other "National Championship;" Adding a second exception to the Sunday rule could lead to additional requests from other sports to be permitted an opportunity to compete on Sundays.

504.M. Sundays

In order to provide at least one (1) day of respite from involvement in interscholastic athletics each week, no interscholastic games or practices of any kind are to be held on Sunday.

Exception #1. Those schools founded upon religious tenets that observe a Sabbath rest from Friday sundown until Saturday sundown may practice or play on Sundays. These schools must register each year by August 1 for the following year with their Section office and observe a day of respite from sundown Friday to sundown Saturday. No school requesting a religious exception may participate in interscholastic participation (practice and/or games) on seven (7) consecutive 24-hour days.

- Schools requesting an exception must provide documentation, if requested, of religious belief adhering to the basis of the exception.
- Schools requesting an exception must provide documentation, if requested, of adherence to the rule of no interscholastic participation (practice and/or contest) within seven (7) consecutive 24-hour days.

NOTE: Declaration of Alternate Day of Respite Form is available through your local CIF Section office.

Exception #2. Traditional Competitive Cheer teams competing in the annual National High School Competitive Cheer event. This exception may be used one-time per school year for the above event only. Schools seeking an exception for the NHSCC event should contact their local CIF Section office.

- Schools requesting an exception must provide documentation, if requested, of adherence to the rule of no interscholastic participation (practice and/or contest) within seven (7) consecutive 24-hour days.
- (1) Violation of Bylaw 504.M. will result in the following sanctions:
 - a. **Practice:** For every practice conducted during the declared respite time, the violating school will be prohibited from conducting twice as many regularly scheduled practices (2 for 1);
 - b. **Game:** A game played during the declared respite time will result in forfeiture of the game.
- (2) In addition to the above sanctions, the Section may impose any of the following additional sanctions:
 - a. The final season record will be reduced by at least one (1) win at the conclusion of the season;
 - b. The school will be placed on probation;
 - c. The team/individual will be ineligible to advance to or in Section, Regional or State Championships;
 - d. Reduction of maximum number of contests allowed for the following year in that sport;
- e. Repeated violation may result in suspension of membership in the CIF. (May 2000 Federated Council/Revised May 2004 Federated Council/Revised April 2018 Federated Council)

The <u>Del Rio</u> League proposes the following changes to the CIF-SS bylaws.

Bylaw 504. M. Sundays

Proposed language:

In order to provide at least one day of respite from involvement in interscholastic athletics each week, no interscholastic games or practices are to be held on Sunday.

ADD: Exception: In the sport of Traditional Competitive Cheer –Only those schools that participate in NHSCC may have a one-time exemption for that event once per year, provided approval from the CIF-SS office is granted.

RATIONALE: In TCC, the season of sport is much longer than that of any other sport. Cheerleaders also do not participate in traditional head-to-head competition in their leagues like other sports do. National-level competitions have provided wonderful opportunities for these high school athletes to compete and be seen by college recruiters. These athletes will miss the important opportunities that they have had prior to CIF inclusion. (Asking these competitions to move away from their Sunday spot is difficult as they require large venues.)

*The National High School Cheerleading Championship (NHSCC) is considered by most to be the most prestigious cheerleading championship in the country. It is also the only cheerleading championship endorsed by the NFHS. An estimated eight hundred of the most advanced teams, representing about 31 states will compete at the Walt Disney Resort in Orlando, Florida. ESPN and ESPN2 are expected to televise the event in 32 countries and is expected to reach 100 million homes.

High School Coaches, Parents Helping Students to the Finish Line

The finish line – a familiar image in high school sports and performing arts.

The breaking of the tape in a 100-meter dash. Crossing the goal line with the winning touchdown. Touching the end wall first in the 100-meter freestyle.

Claiming the state debate title after a long and grueling season.

Sometime next year, we hope there's a new finish line – one that ends the COVID-19 pandemic and the return of full-scale athletics and performing arts in our nation's schools. In advance of that dream later in 2021, the next four months are critical as schools try to keep these programs going with the start of winter indoor activities.

Soon, it is the hope that all states will be competing in high school sports as the final six states begin play over the next two months. And as the move to winter activities occurs, there are two groups of individuals that will continue to play significant roles in high school sports and performing arts making it to the finish line – coaches and parents.

In addition to their existing workloads, high school coaches have acquired a number of other challenges this year, including serving as mask enforcers, dealing with the weekly loss of players due to COVID-19 quarantine, and connecting with players virtually in those areas of the country where activities have been modified or pushed back to later in the year.

The tasks of education-based coaches are extraordinary this year, and they deserve our utmost respect and appreciation. In those situations where students lack guidance at home, coaches may be the most significant mentors in students' lives.

Earlier this year, the NFHS launched a new program to assist high school coaches with these important tasks. The NFHS School Honor Roll is a national recognition program designed to promote professional development for high school coaches through the completion of specific courses on the NFHS Learning Center at www.NFHSLearn.com.

In the first seven months of the program, more than 70 schools have earned this special recognition and provided important education resources for their coaches. In return, schools receive a large banner to place in their gymnasiums indicating that they are in the NFHS School Honor Roll.

Schools can achieve three levels of merit within the Honor Roll, which are obtained once 90 percent of a school's coaches – excluding volunteer coaches – complete various course combinations.

Three free offerings from the Learning Center – "Concussion in Sports," "Sudden Cardiac Arrest" and "Protecting Students from Abuse" – as well as "Fundamentals of Coaching" comprise the required courses for Level 1. To earn Level 2, coaches must navigate the courses that pertain specifically to their sports, as well as "First Aid, Health and Safety," "Heat Illness Prevention" and "Student Mental Health and Suicide Prevention." Finally, a Level 3 banner can be attained for schools when their coaches complete "Sportsmanship," "Strength and Conditioning," "Teaching and Modeling Behavior," "Engaging Effectively with Parents" and "Bullying, Hazing, and Inappropriate Behaviors" courses.

North Carolina has been the runaway leader among the states with 52 schools earning Honor Roll status, including five that have achieved multiple levels. In addition to the competitive spirit on the field, this is a great example of friendly pride and competition off the field. We salute these schools and school districts in North Carolina for encouraging ongoing education.

In addition to North Carolina, schools in 10 other states have been recognized, including Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, South Carolina, California, Mississippi, Indiana, New Jersey and Texas. The first international school joined the NFHS School Honor Roll recently with the American International School in Vienna, Austria, earning Level 1 status.

Likewise, the active support of parents as schools face ever-changing plans is crucial in this stress-filled year. While it is understandable that parents want

their kids participating in sports and performing arts, leading by example and supporting the school's program can serve as a life-changing teachable moment.

In an effort to help parents support high school activity programs, the NFHS has added new content on the NFHS Learning Center and provided a way for parents to achieve NFHS National Parent Credential certification.

The curriculum for the National Parent Credential is comprised of two free courses – "The Parent Seat" and "Positive Parenting Within School Programs."

Parents who achieve the National Parent Credential receive a certificate and a badge to be displayed on their Learning Center dashboard.

Regardless of the differences in competition right now, there are brighter days ahead as we look to 2021. We thank coaches and parents across the country helping education-based sports and performing arts continue that trek to the finish line.

NFHS Network Offers Viewing Alternative with Attendance Restrictions at High School Events

In many homes across our nation last week, families gathered – socially distanced of course – and were able to pause and reflect on things for which they are thankful in what has been a tumultuous year.

From the COVID-19 pandemic that struck in March, to the racial tensions that followed, to the worst fire and hurricane seasons in history, to the turbulent political issues, 2020 will be etched in our memories forever.

Throughout all the turmoil and challenges, however, has been the persistent continuation of one of our nation's most defining elements – education-based high school sports and performing arts in our schools.

Hopefully, thanks was expressed last week for the privilege of having these programs in our schools – a privilege that does not exist in most countries in the

world. Likewise, an expression of thanks for the privilege of competing in sports and performing arts – in whatever fashion and at whatever time during the school year – in the middle of a global pandemic.

As the fall sports season concludes soon and winter activities begin, there are, indeed, victories to celebrate and thanks to be given. Thirty of the 35 states that were able to offer football and volleyball this fall planned to conduct state championships, and by early January hopefully all states will accomplish their original objectives. Although modifications were necessary in many cases, most states were able to offer cross country and soccer as well.

The resurgence of the virus in some areas of the country has presented challenges to continuing sports, but we remain hopeful that the remaining states will be able to offer at least condensed seasons in all sports. States such as North Carolina and Virginia, which were unable to start activities earlier this fall, have commenced practices and will be starting basketball later this month or in early January.

Mitigation strategies have intensified in many states, including the requirement for participants to wear masks. We are aware of at least 10 states that are requiring masks during actual competition, which is not ideal but necessary to lessen the risk of spreading the virus.

And then there is the growing challenge of whether fans can attend sports or performing arts events. While many areas of the country allowed a certain number of fans to attend contests earlier this fall – with masks in most instances – those opportunities seem to be diminishing.

Fortunately, the NFHS anticipated this development as the pandemic began and is providing parents, students and other fans an alternative when in-person attendance is not permitted.

Now in its eighth year of existence, the NFHS Network, which streams high school sports and other events over the internet at www.NFHSNetwork.com, is providing its greatest service ever by offering two free Pixellot automated-production units for schools that lack production capabilities to stream events through its High School Support Program.

Amazingly, the NFHS Network, which has covered more than 442,000 high school events since its launch in 2013, recently contracted its 10,000th Pixellot device and is in the process of installing the units in schools nationwide. While parents and other fans would rather be in the stands to support the team, the opportunity to watch the game via the NFHS Network has been a tremendous alternative.

This week alone, the NFHS Network is streaming football playoffs in 12 states, including eight state championships, and has covered volleyball, field hockey and soccer state championships as well. Soon, the NFHS Network will be covering regular-season basketball, wrestling, swimming and diving, and ice hockey contests in the 46 states that are a part of the NFHS Network.

With these winter sports being conducted indoors, the restrictions on attendance likely will continue. However, through the NFHS Network, fans can watch a school's entire month of events for only \$10.99 – an amount far less than individual tickets to events throughout the month would cost.

Since August, almost 83,000 events have been streamed on the NFHS

Network, and there are expectations that number will exceed 200,000 by the end

of the school year. If that number is attained, there are two victories to be celebrated – high school games will continue to be played through the remainder of the 2020-21 school year and fans will continue to view those contests on the NFHS Network.

In addition to sporting events, cheer and dance competitions, band, choir, theatre, speech and debate festivals and other non-athletic activities, including graduations, are available on the NFHS Network in those cases where attendance restrictions exist.

We hope the opportunity for fans to be back in stadiums, gymnasiums and auditoriums returns soon. Until then, the NFHS Network will be there to cover those events.

As Students Return to Sports, Sportsmanship and Respect Must Be Emphasized

Every now and then, an event occurs that serves as a wake-up call and reminds us that we have some work left to accomplish. We are aware of two such events recently that were rather disturbing, and the issues behind those events need our full attention.

Understandably, school leaders have been focused on simply getting high school athletics programs restarted – or rallying teams on Zoom calls in some parts of the country until restarts are possible. However, once those programs are up and running, the core messages of education-based activities must take center stage.

First, we believe most student participants who have been able to return to competition are grateful for the opportunity simply to be playing sports or participating in performing arts. We have heard of many instances of students going the extra mile to help others, or teams involved in community service projects. Even with reduced seasons and stringent mitigation measures in place, there have been expressions of thanks for the chance to return to the field, gym or stage.

Students, coaches and athletic directors have their hands full trying to meet COVID-19 requirements on a weekly basis, which has certainly made for a stressful environment in schools nationwide. However, those core values of education-based athletics and performing arts such as sportsmanship and respect must continue to be emphasized.

The first event occurred the day after Thanksgiving when race-related friction led to a brawl at the conclusion of a football playoff game between two Florida schools. Disciplinary action has been taken by the Florida High School Athletic Association, but the fact that another racially motivated incident occurred in high school sports is disappointing.

High school sports and activities exist to lift people up, not demean or tear people down. The goal is to treat everyone equally, treat each other with respect, regardless of the color of one's skin – the very fundamentals of high school sports and activities in our nation's schools where all genders, all races, all religions work together to accomplish a goal. Obviously, we still have work to do.

In another event last week in one of the more blatant displays of unsportsmanlike conduct in recent memory, a player from Edinburg (Texas) High School, running full steam from the sideline, bowled over the referee after the

official had ejected the player for two consecutive unsportsmanlike behavior penalties.

While the player was escorted from the stadium by police and charged, and the Edinburg school district removed the team from the Texas University Interscholastic League (UIL) playoffs and denounced the player's actions, the video went viral. This was a bad and ugly scene.

This absolutely is not what education-based high school sports is about, but it shows what can happen when the intensity of the sport supersedes having fun and working together as a team. This happens when an individual is more concerned about himself than the team. There are several non-negotiables as a high school sports participant, and assaulting an official is at the top of that list.

Last year, we heard reports of officials retiring early because of boorish behavior by parents and other fans; however, we believed that once teams returned to play from the lockdown, the support for officials would be stronger as students would be grateful for the opportunity to play, and parents and other fans would be thankful for the chance to attend contests and/or support their children. And despite this incident, we still believe this to be the case, and we hope this is an isolated case that never occurs again.

This event comes on the heels of reports from several states about increasing needs for officials – mostly due to some men and women opting not to officiate this year due to health concerns from COVID-19.

The NFHS continues its efforts to recruit more officials through its #BecomeAnOfficial program at highschoolofficials.com. Now in its fourth year, almost 50,000 individuals have expressed interest in becoming an official and have contacted their state association to start the process. And the interest has

continued with another 6,000 people expressing interest in the first six weeks of this school year.

While we desperately need more individuals to officiate high school sports, we must ensure that they are treated with respect and protected from verbal and physical abuse. These individuals are giving of their free time to make sure the games go on for millions of high school student-athletes.

Mitigation Efforts Must Intensify as Winter Sports, Performing Arts Begin

To play or not to play winter high school sports and other activity programs

– that is the decision being considered by state high school associations, state
health and education departments, and state governments.

While 35 states offered football this fall – with 30 leading to state championships – and another 10 states were able to sponsor other fall sports, the outlook for traditional winter sports and activities held indoors is proving to be one of the toughest decisions since the COVID-19 pandemic wiped out two-thirds of state basketball finals last spring.

According to the <u>NFHS 2020-21 Basketball Seasons Modifications Map</u>, 22 states have plans to conduct high school basketball in a fairly normal timeframe,

while 29 (28 states plus the District of Columbia) have announced modifications for the season, many of which include delays to later in the year.

With the number of positive COVID-19 cases rising across the country, two of the core issues in making these winter sports decisions are determining how prevalent the transmission of the virus is in actual competition and the mitigation strategies necessary for indoor activities.

And to make these decisions even more difficult, while the physical health and safety of participants must remain the No. 1 criterion, there continues to be the social, emotional and mental health concerns if students are unable to participate in sports and performing arts. In short, these decisions are about the value of involvement in education-based activities vs. the concerns of no involvement in these life-changing programs.

The shift to indoor sports (basketball, wrestling, ice hockey, swimming and diving) this winter has elevated concerns about virus spread as participants will be in close proximity in enclosed settings. While there have been a few cases of large-scale virus spread reportedly traced to sport contact, we know from communication with state high school association leaders throughout the fall that, in fact, quarantines were more often enacted due to team members contracting the virus in other settings and bringing it into practices or games.

While at least one statewide survey seemed to support these reports from state associations that actual sport contact has not been the primary source of virus transmission, the NFHS Sports Medicine Advisory Committee is involved in gathering national data about the risk of COVID-19 spread from direct contact in sports competition this fall.

Regarding performing arts programs, the <u>unprecedented aerosol study</u> <u>commissioned by the NFHS</u>, the College Band Directors National Association and more than 125 other groups has demonstrated – through scientific research – that music activities can be successfully conducted by following several mitigation strategies.

In those schools with in-person learning, if participants playing wind instruments wear surgical-style masks with a slit for the mouthpiece, and use an appropriate bell cover, aerosol emission is reduced between 60 and 90 percent.

Mitigation strategies outlined in the first two releases of the aerosol study have helped to keep music programs going this fall in several states, and the third round of results released last week hopefully will enable more schools to feel confident in continuing music programs – in those schools where students are engaged in in-person learning – because the scientific data has become more refined.

As high school sports and other activities move indoors in the coming weeks, there are a number of mitigation efforts that schools must have in place if events are going to happen successfully.

In addition to the core protective elements of wearing masks, social distancing and proper hygiene, indoor activities will require the additional precautionary tasks of proper facility management and crowd management. Facilities must be properly sanitized, and ventilation systems must be in working order.

Crowds must be managed to accommodate the necessary distancing of spectators, and plans must be in place to keep fans from congregating, such as at halftime or following the game. One idea to enhance social distancing is to

eliminate concession stands this year – or at least package items in a manner that improves the flow and lessens the chance of fan interaction.

Certainly, there are situations in some states where state health or government leaders are making decisions to return schools – and sports and activities – to virtual learning due to spiking positivity rates. And focusing on the physical health and safety of students, coaches, officials and spectators must come first.

However, in these cases, we encourage individuals to keep the faith and have plans in place when that next opportunity comes. High school sports have been a part of our nation's schools for more than 100 years. They have survived world wars, natural disasters and countless funding challenges, and they will survive the COVID-19 pandemic.

Editorial I Why CIF made right call further delaying start of high school sports

Tuesday, high school sports learned that start dates for fall sports, already pushed back, are now "on hold" awaiting updated guidelines from state health officials, which aren't expected until after the first of the new year.

The announcement by the California Interscholastic Federation came less than two weeks before local teams were to start practice for the delayed season and as it has become apparent public schools won't resume in-person classes before January at the earliest. California previously was one of only six states to have no fall sports for high school teams.

CIF officials may have made this call after seeing what is happening at other levels of sports competition. College sports are on a maddening cycle of canceled games. San Jose State's football team, for instance, lost two recent games to COVID-19-related cancellations. College basketball just started and already a game between UCLA and Long Beach State was canceled over COVID-19 concerns. Stanford University's women's basketball team had to cancel upcoming home games because of Santa Clara County's ban on contact sports.

Meanwhile, the National Basketball Association is getting ready to start another season, but this time outside the "bubble" where top teams played earlier this year in Florida. Of all the major sports, basketball, played indoors with players and fans in close proximity, would seem to be the most virus-virulent.

Pro football has seemingly gone all in for whatever revenue can still be scraped off this pandemic-altered season. The San Francisco 49ers will be playing their next two "home" games in Arizona after Santa Clara County's ruling stopped contact sports through Dec. 21, with no assurance games will be allowed in early 2021 either.

In a travesty of competition, last Sunday the Denver Broncos saw all their quarterbacks ruled ineligible for a game against the New Orleans Saints, and instead played a reserve who was playing in his first NFL game. On Wednesday night, the Baltimore Ravens were finally cleared, after three postponements, to play the Pittsburgh Steelers – but without their star quarterback and other key players, ruled out because of COVID-19 concerns.

It's one thing, however misguided, for the NFL to proceed with its schedule. The players are all adults and highly paid, and each team is spending about \$1.5 million for daily tests.

But we feel the most sympathy for high school athletes.

For most who compete, this level is the highest they will go in their organized sports lives. With COVID-19 cases surging throughout California, however, the risks of infection and spreading the virus to families and then onto more vulnerable people is simply too great to allow games to take place.

Santa Cruz County high school coaches and players reacted to Tuesday's CIF announcement with frustration and anger, since many have been gearing up for months for a mid-December liftoff for their programs. One coach told the Sentinel the latest delay is "embarrassing" since other states seem to be allowing competition without major problems and that high school student athletes are not a vulnerable demographic.

But unlike even college sports, which have the financial wherewithal to conduct frequent testing and where few players live at home where they can pass on the virus to others, high school programs don't have the luxury of in-house medical staffs to ensure safety precautions are being followed.

And every player who contracts COVID-19, even if relatively symptom free, runs the risk of spreading the infection to other players, who then can send it spiraling out further.

At this point, it seems highly unlikely high school sports programs would be ready to go before February. And with a vaccine probably not widely available until mid-spring at the earliest, that date seems unrealistic as well.

Hospitalizations are rising more sharply than ever throughout California, climbing to the highest point of the pandemic, with the greater Bay Area recording its 2,000th death from COVID-19 earlier this week. The death total is Santa Cruz County had risen to 37 Thursday.

The only acceptable guideline is to stop practices and games until the pandemic threat is greatly reduced.

And that time is not now.
